# The American Association of Neuroscience Nurses and American Board of Neuroscience Nursing

## Release Position Statement on the Value of Certification in Neuroscience Nursing

**Chicago, IL— January 2023 —** The American Association of Neuroscience Nurses (AANN), in conjunction with the American Board of Neuroscience Nursing (ABNN), has released an updated position statement on the value of certification in neuroscience nursing.

It is the position of AANN and ABNN that

- certification advances nursing practice through the demonstration of specialized knowledge in the respective neuroscience area
- the rigorous national certification examinations validate clinical and professional knowledge and judgment in a well-defined specialty practice area
- certification provides benefits to the certified nurse, their employer, the public, and patients.

AANN recognizes neuroscience nursing practice as a nursing specialty. ABNN recognized the need for the professional neuroscience nurse to achieve certification in their field. ABNN developed the first neuroscience nursing certification program in 1978 with the Certified Neuroscience Registered Nurse (CNRN) program. In 2013, ABNN added the Stroke Certified Registered Nurse (SCRN) certification program, and in 2021, AANN in collaboration with ABNN created the Certificate Program for the Seizure and Epilepsy Healthcare Professional. The certifications demonstrate to patients, peers, employers, and the public that the certified nurse has attained specialized knowledge and skills in caring for a unique patient population.
